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
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

2020 Earl Riskey Award Recipient

This past March I traveled to Albuquerque, New Mexico to compete in my first National Singles Paddleball Tournament. My motivation for traveling to New Mexico from Michigan was twofold. First, I always wanted to go out west and play in a singles tournament. Second, I had played in the Rocky Mountain Doubles tournament the year before in Albuquerque. I was really impressed with the quality of the tournament, the welcoming participants, the host community, and the tournament director Gary Mazaroff.

It was clear to me that Gary is more than simply a tournament director; he is a guy who really takes a personal interest in his participants. For example, last year my partner Paul Carr and I had a terrible time getting to the tournament. After getting stuck in Chicago, due to one of our famous Midwestern snowstorms, we were ready to simply head back home. Here's where Gary personally reached out to us with assistance and reassurance. So when this year's National Tournament was scheduled in Albuquerque again, Paul and I didn't give it a second thought, we were all in!

It was shortly after this year's tournament that NPA President Jim Owens approached me with an idea. He asked me if I would write an article on Gary Mazaroff winning the Earl Riskey Award. Well, because I think Gary is such an exceptional man, I eagerly accepted the task!

Let me start off by giving you a little history about Earl Riskey.

Earl Riskey invented the sport of Paddleball in 1930. He was a Physical Education instructor and later director of the intramural sports program at the University of Michigan. Interestingly, during inclement weather, U of M's tennis teams would be forced to practice in doors on the handball courts. They used wooden paddles from paddle tennis for their workouts. It wasn't long before Riskey saw the potential for the addition of a new intramural sport. A sport that used worn tennis balls or dime store rubber balls and wooden paddles. From there, the awesome game of Paddleball was born.

Annually the NPA board looks for an extraordinary individual to nominate for the Earl Riskey Award. Someone who embodies the personal character and commitment to continue the growth and promotion of the sport of Paddleball. In other words, someone who would continue to be the standard bearer of Paddleball that Earl Riskey carried over 90 years ago.

Gary's goal is to promote all court sports with the objective of saving the courts! He reminds me of Superman, as he singlehandedly goes from town to town managing tournaments and fighting the Lex Luthor's of the world who are trying to convert our courts into some other use. His passion is courageous and contagious, as his band of Superhero's follow his lead to achieve his selfless quest.

Aaron Embry, from San Diego, has known Gary for so many years says: "It was when my Mom started playing Racquetball that I first met Gary. He was running tournaments 35-40 years ago and promoting court sports. Gary typifies the Earl Riskey ideal. He's always promoting court sports, giving back to the players on many levels including the Am-Pro Certification Teaching Program, and more importantly giving back to the communities."

Frossene King from Albuquerque, is a living example of Gary's continued dedication to the promotion of Paddleball. "Gary Mazaroff gives so much to the sport and to the players," Frossene states. "He continues to provide opportunities to advance the game and build a community of players. I had never even heard of Paddleball until one day Gary said: 'There is a Paddleball tournament coming up in Albuquerque next month. You should play. Come by Sunday night to practice with the group. I have a paddle you can borrow.' And the rest is history, I've been hooked on the game ever since, thanks to Gary."

When I asked my new friend and competitor, Dr. Dominic Maestas, for a couple of thoughts on Gary's contribution to Paddleball he couldn't stop writing:

Says Dr. Maestas; "Leadership, proactive, education, and growth are just a few of the many words that can be used to describe Gary Mazaroff. But the best and lasting name for Gary is "The Great One". Gary has been responsible for more large gatherings bringing together enjoyment, competition, social interaction, and learning as an equation for growing and ensuring paddleball's success. He has practiced what he has preached that those of us who play have a responsibility to sustain and to grow the sport. Gary has done this tirelessly and with great stewardship. From Age Group Championships at Rocky Mountain Championships to fundraisers to National/International development campaigns, Gary has been an inspirational source of inhibiting a zero-growth mode for paddleball. He keenly understands the changing club climate and is always up for Sunday afternoon Paddleball matches or games at the Venice Beach district on the outdoor courts. The message Gary has been responsible for is that all of us who have a stake in maintaining the infrastructure need to be more proactive-insisting on courts to be in place at all locations in order to drive Paddleball as a court sport as a 'Lifetime' endeavor."

Indeed, Gary has touched so many lives in so many positive ways, both on and off the courts, with his long history of involvement. His love for people and the way people love him back, made it an easy choice to select Gary Mazaroff as this years recipient of the Earl Riskey Award. Congratulations Gary and well deserved!



Then Coe and Beltran started chipping away at the lead. After several very long and punishing rallies, Coe and Beltran were down by just one point with a score of 8 - 9. In the next rally, after several amazing gets by Medina and Romero, the team members collided going for the same ball. This collision caused Romero to take an injury time out. After the injury time out, Medina and Romero never recovered, and ended up losing the second game 15 - 9.

The winners of the Mixed Paddleball combined divisions were Roxanne Rehling and Aaron Embry, both from San Diego. This is their second championship win together. The last time they played this tournament was 2015, and they won it.

The Mixed Paddleball Doubles division saw amazing play and improvement by several players. First was Jaime Blanco Dios and his son Mario Blanco Boullosa, both from Spain. This is Jaime's third time competing in this event. He and his son traveled over five thousand miles to play. It took them a little while to get their feet under them, but by the end they were playing great. The other person who needs to be mentioned is Jewelz Santiago from New York. Jewelz is a fantastic 1-wall paddleball player but she had never played 3-wall paddleball before. She had to learn new skills and tactics very quickly, but like all talented champions, she pulled it off.

AGE RULES

The National Paddleball Association once again returned to the Dow Bay Area Family YMCA in Bay City, Michigan, on December 4th for the 2019 NPA Brigham Classic. And once again, Bay City hosted a very successful tournament. As usual, it ran smoothly and was a fun event by all accounts.

Thirty-two players, sixteen teams, entered from various parts of Michigan. Notably, veteran tournament director Chad Krager persuaded a couple of those teams to change divisions, enabling him to create two brackets of eight teams with drop-downs resulting in four competitive divisions: Open, A, B, and C.

Ron Malecki and Sandy DeGreif, two-time 55+ Division national champs, asked to play in an age division. But, since there were no divisions with age restrictions offered, the director put the fellow Bay Area players in the open.

The 55+ championship team's first game was very close, defeating the team of Jim Howland and Andy Pappas 21-18. After that, Malecki and DeGreif easily won the remaining games through the semifinal, earning a place in the Open Final.

The Ann Arbor area team of Jim Swendris and Ron Harris, the number one seed and a team also of an age that would qualify to play in a 55+ division prevailed in the top half of the bracket.

After two hard-fought games, Ron Malecki and Sandy DeGreif claimed the Open title, 21-20, 21-15.

West Coast Player Profile--Ricardo Callado

This issue's West Coast Player Profile focuses on Ricardo Callado, who came out of the Sorrento Valley Racquetball Club and is easily recognized at all of the paddleball venues in San Diego and Riverside counties.

Ricardo's background is uniquely diverse. Though he was born on the US side of the border, he's just as comfortable on the Mexican side and has lived for extended periods in both countries. Similarly, his sports experience covers a very broad range. He's won championships in bowling and distance running, has competed in mountain bike racing and sailing, and dabbled in gymnastics, street hockey, boxing, tennis, karate, and even ballet. So Ricardo not only brings a lot of skills to paddleball, he also brings lots of friends to paddleball, and when you see Ricardo on the court, your likely to see a new face or two nearby, usually smiling, as Ricardo has been one of the players most active in building the sport in Southern California.



One of Ricardo's converts to the game is his father-in-law, Mike Barrera, who has also become quite a regular in tournaments, hit-arounds, and other competitions, and often partners with Ricardo, not just in paddleball, but also in sailing competitions. Mike is equally tenacious and competitive.

Ricardo was born in San Diego in 1984, but spent most of his first two years on his father's ranch about two hours south of Tijuana. The Callado Ranch has been described as "very rustic", and basically off the grid. The place still serves as a sort of refuge for beleaguered urbanites and paddleball players who need to get away from it all for a while. But because of the ranch's remoteness, it wasn't the best place for school, and so Ricardo moved to bustling Tijuana for his primary school years, and then back to the US again for college. There he met the equally athletic Karla Barrera (a lifelong runner and marathoner) and they began their five year courtship. Most of that time they lived in Mexico. When they married, in 2014, they returned to the US, and took up residence with Karla's family in Chula Vista.

Ricardo began working out at Sorrento Valley Racquetball during the mornings before work. There he met Charlie Brumfield, who pushed him onto the court and got him hitting a ball. From the first day, it was clear that Ricardo was fast, and also determined. Even before developing a swing, Ricardo could get to any ball, and developed a reputation as a tenacious competitor. No ball could be counted as down when playing Ricardo; not until it bounced twice. Even the top players enjoyed playing him because they were guaranteed a workout. And Ricardo's ability as a getter made him an ideal sparring partner for Charlie Brumfield. The recent photo here shows the two of them in the back lot at the Pacific Paddleball Association, which is now Charlie's home address. Ricardo is holding the classic "Aluminum Brumfield" racket from 1977, arguably the worst racket ever manufactured for any purpose.



Asked what it was like as a beginner playing the likes of Charlie Brumfield and Emmett Coe every day, Ricardo said this:

"It impacted me in numerous positive ways:

I had to set up smaller goals and move up from that. At first, my goal with Charlie was to last more than 5 minutes in court; after that, I only wanted to avoid getting the donut. Then, I wanted to get five points; then more, and so on and so on... I spent my first year without ever winning a singles match -- against anyone. But I enjoyed every loss. Plus, it is fun to lose against a legendary talent like Charlie.

Not having any racquetball experience, I learned to play paddleball from scratch. By playing against Charlie and Emmett, I had to become comfortable hitting the ball off balance, and I learned the benefits of gradually wearing your opponent down using control as opposed to killing the ball with fierce power. Also, I never think about whether or not I will be able to get to the ball on time, before the second bounce. I just go for it as fast as I can to find out!"

In 2018, Ricardo and Karla had a baby boy, their first, Ricky, who already shows athletic promise and competitiveness. In 2019, Ricky won the Crawlathon at the Del Mar Fair Grounds. That's actually a pretty big deal and the trophy was almost as tall as he was.



Ricky has since outgrown crawling contests and is walking and running at a pace to keep both parents busy. During the coronavirus lockdown, outside of a 5K run each night, Ricardo and Karla have been spending a lot of quality time with Ricky, and Ricky has been supplying them with aerobic workouts to nelp them further improve their endurance skills.



































PRESIDENT'S CORNER

I hope you, your families, and friends are healthy and remain so as the world comes to grips with this very contagious and deadly novel coronavirus, COVID-19, a global pandemic.

What a difference a month can make.

March 6th through March 8th: The history-making 2020 National Paddleball Association's National Singles Championships and Rocky Mountain Doubles tournaments took place in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Gary Mazaroff, president of the New Mexico Racquetball Association and master tournament director, so labeled the event in a promotional piece leading up to the tournaments. It was the first time New Mexico has hosted an NPA sanctioned event. This history-making event was a big success.

COVID-19 Count: U.S. 319 confirmed total cases, 15 total deaths

March 9th: My wife Rochelle and I had a post-tournament dinner with Gary and his wife Jennifer in Albuquerque. I remember talking about the virus that evening. Michigan and New Mexico were two of a few states that had no confirmed cases of COVID-19. Earlier in the day, Rochelle and I decided to reroute our return to Michigan. There were news reports that two TSA workers at LAX (Los Angeles, CA) had tested positive for COVID-19, and we were to change planes at LAX. I called Delta around 4:30 p.m. and received a return call a little after midnight. Delta did reroute us through Salt Lake City at no additional cost.

COVID-19 Count: U.S. 704 confirmed total cases, 26 total deaths

Michigan 0 cases, 0 deaths

March 10th: The first two people tested positive for the virus in Michigan, and the governor promptly issued a state of emergency.

COVID-19 Count: U.S. 994 confirmed total cases, 30 deaths

Michigan 2 total confirmed cases, 0 deaths

March 12th: All k-12 Michigan schools closed.

COVID-19 Count: U.S. 1630 total confirmed cases, 41 total deaths

March 13th: I announced to the Board of Managers that we would vote on a proposal from Vice President Jamie Lawson to cancel the 2020 NPA National Doubles tournament scheduled for April 18th & 19th in Midland, Michigan, and reschedule it for fall if conditions permit. The four-member executive board unanimously supported the proposal. The vote would be on Monday, March 16th.

COVID-19 Count: U.S. 2183 total confirmed cases, 48 total deaths

March 16th: 'Places of public accommodation' were closed in the state of Michigan, which includes, restaurants, bars, and gyms. The proposal to cancel National Doubles and reschedule it for the fall if conditions permit passed by a vote of 11 to 0. Two board members did not vote. The result of the vote also makes the 2020 NPA National Doubles tournament historic. The Bay City paddleball group canceled the Bean Smith Doubles tournament scheduled for April 4th. The rescheduled date is to be determined. The Mid-Michigan Paddleball Players canceled the Saginaw King/Queen, Prince/Princess of the Court tournament scheduled for March 21st.

COVID-19 Count: U.S. 4,596 total confirmed cases, 87 total deaths

March 24th: The 'stay home, stay safe' executive order went into effect in Michigan.

COVID-19 Count: U.S. 55,222 total confirmed cases, 781 total deaths

April 14th: The day before I submitted this article.

COVID-19 Count: U.S. 622,412 confirmed cases, 27,549 total deaths

Michigan 27,001 total confirmed cases, 1,768 total deaths
